

A Guide to Beijing's Urban Wildlife



This guide has been compiled for the **Ambassadors for Nature** initiative and includes the wildlife most likely to be encountered in urban Beijing, especially the embassy districts.

1. Amphibians

Frogs and Toads

1. **Asiatic Toad** *Bufo gargarizan* 中华大蟾蜍 Zhong Hua Da Chan Chu

2. Birds

Beijing is a brilliant place to watch birds. More than 500 different species have been recorded in the Chinese capital, which beats most major capital cities. In fact, Beijing ranks second, only to Brasilia, amongst G20 capital cities for the number of species recorded. Here is a short guide to the most common birds encountered in central Beijing's parks and green spaces. During migration season (Spring and Autumn), many more species will be possible.

Eurasian Kestrel (*Falco tinnunculus*, 红隼)



Breeds in small numbers in the city. Eats small rodents (mice, voles) and small birds. Can see ultra-violet!

Spotted Dove (*Streptopelia chinensis*, 珠颈斑鸠)




Common in parks and gardens. Often seen on the ground.

Hoopoe (*Upupa epops*, 戴胜)



One of Beijing's most spectacular birds.
Raises its crest when excited or alarmed.

Grey-capped Pygmy Woodpecker (*Yungipicus canicapillus*, 星头啄木鸟)



Beijing's smallest woodpecker. Common in parks and urban green spaces.

Great Spotted Woodpecker (*Dendrocopos major*, 大斑啄木鸟)



Common in the city parks and any green spaces.

Grey-headed Woodpecker (*Picus canus*, 灰头绿啄木鸟)



The Grey-headed Woodpecker is common in open woodland and parks. Likes to feed on the ground. Ants are its favourite food!

Azure-winged Magpie (*Cyanopica cyanus*, 灰喜鹊)



One of the most noticeable birds in central Beijing. Sociable and often seen in noisy flocks.

Oriental Magpie (*Pica serica*, 喜鹊)



One of the cleverest and most adaptable species of bird and a very common species in Beijing. A scavenger.

Carrion Crow (*Corvus corone*, 小嘴乌鸦)



A scavenger. Eats rubbish left behind by people!

Large-billed Crow (*Corvus macrohynchos*, 大嘴乌鸦)



A close relative of the Carrion Crow but prefers parks and mountains.

Japanese (Eastern Great) Tit (*Parus minor*, 大山雀)



The most common member of the tit family in Beijing. Like a 'washed out' Great Tit from Europe. Eats insects in summer and seeds in winter.

Marsh Tit (*Poecile palustris*, 沼泽山雀)



Acrobatic and noisy.
Can be found in parks
all over Beijing.

Barn Swallow (*Hirundo rustica*, 家燕)



A common migrant and
summer visitor to
Beijing. Makes nests of
mud in hutongs.

Red-rumped Swallow (*Cecropis daurica*, 金腰燕)



A common migrant and
summer visitor to
Beijing. Similar to Barn
Swallow but note pale
rump and streaked
underparts. Makes nests
of mud in hutongs.

Beijing Swift (*Apus apus pekinensis*, 普通楼燕)



One of Beijing's most iconic birds. Sometimes mistaken for a swallow, the Beijing Swift is an all-dark bird that can be seen in 'screaming' flocks around some of Beijing's most famous landmarks (Tiananmen Square, Yonghegong, etc). Arrives in April from southern Africa and is gone by the end of July. Eats, drinks and even sleeps in the air!

Chinese (Light-vented) Bulbul (*Pycnonotus sinensis*, 白头鹎)



A relatively common Beijing bird in parks and green spaces. Eats berries and insects.

Crested Myna (*Acridotheres cristatellus*, 八哥)



Seen in large parks. Likes to mimic other birds.

White-cheeked Starling (*Sturnus cineraceus*, 灰椋鸟)



Seen all year round and breeds in tree-holes in parks and large gardens.

Eurasian Tree Sparrow (*Passer montanus*, 树麻雀)



One of Beijing's most common resident birds. Can be seen foraging on streets and in parks.

(Chinese) Blackbird (*Turdus merula mandarinus*, 乌鸫)



Breeds in the larger parks and gardens, especially in the diplomatic quarter. Probably Beijing's best songster.

Chinese Grosbeak (*Eophona migratoria*, 黑尾蜡嘴雀)




Eats seeds and nuts.
Seen in parks. Has a
beautiful whistling song.

3. Butterflies

Beijing is blessed with more than 180 species of butterfly. Many are adapted to specific habitats, such as the alpine meadows of the highest mountains or the mixed original woodlands on the outskirts of Beijing. In central Beijing only the most common, generalist, species occur. The most likely species to be encountered in the city are below. 


Bath White *Pieris daplidice* 花斑云粉蝶 Huā bān yún fěndié

4. Dragonflies and Damselflies

Beijing has recorded at least 67 species of dragonfly and damselfly. Inside the 6th ring road, some of the best locations for seeing these spectacular insects include the Botanical Gardens and the Olympic Forest Park. The mountains and valleys of northern and western Beijing, for example Huairou, Mentougou, Miyun and Yanqing Districts are also great places to explore. Inside the 3rd ring road, the most likely species to be encountered are below. 5. Mammals

Beijing is a surprisingly good place for mammals. Outside the 6th ring road roam Amur Leopard Cats, Siberian Roe Deer, two species of badger, Wild Boar to name a few. Siberian Chipmunk *Tamias sibiricus* 花鼠 Huā shǔ

Can be found in any wooded areas from mountains to parks, including many of the parks in the city (e.g. Ritan Park, Temple of Heaven Park).



Amur Hedgehog *Erinaceus amurensis* 东北刺猬 Dōngběi cìwèi

Fairly common in parks and scrubby areas but due to its nocturnal habits, not often seen.




Short-faced Mole *Scaptochirus moschatus* 麝鼹 Shè yǎn

The only mole species to occur in the capital lowlands. It's a species of mole adapted to arid conditions.

Siberian Weasel *Mustela sibirica* 黄鼬 Huángyòu

The Siberian Weasel, known as “Huang Shu Lang” is common in Beijing and can even be found in the city centre. Superstition states this animal has the ability to possess people's souls.



6. Reptiles

Beijing boasts at least 17 species of snake, as well as several lizards. Those listed below are those most likely to be encountered in central Beijing. Snakes

Of the 17 species recorded in Beijing, only one is likely to be found inside the 3rd ring road and then only rarely. The Tiger Keelback is usually found near water. It is a strong swimmer and preys mostly on frogs, small rodents.

Tiger Keelback – *Rhabdophis tigrinus* – 虎斑颈槽蛇 – Hǔbān jǐng cáo shé
